



Pupil Premium Impact 2015-2016

The Pupil Premium was introduced by the Government in April 2011 as a means of providing additional funding to schools to address the current inequalities in attainment and progress between those children eligible for free school meals and those whose families who have higher income.

We received pupil premium funding for the financial year 2015-16 of £10,560. This is targeted funding for pupils who are (or have been in the last six years) entitled to free school meals or who are in public care.

The Pupil Premium was used in a variety of ways in order to improve pupil attainment and to help to overcome any barriers to learning. With this in mind, the Pupil Premium allocation was spent as follows;

- To fund the access to the ELSA specialist who supports children with a variety of emotional and social issues, such as self-esteem, confidence building, developing firm friendships, anger management etc thus overcoming barriers to learning
- To fund resources purchased for ELSA led programme
- To fund additional support staff for targeted intervention for individuals and groups
- To fund attendance at school clubs run by external providers
- To fund trips/visits/residential trips
- To fund swimming lessons
- To fund for wider opportunities outside school e.g. Cub/Brownie/Scouting trips, music lessons etc
- To purchase resources in order to support children and build on learning

End of KS1 (2016)

There were 2 children in Year 2 who were eligible for Pupil Premium Grant.

End of KS2 (2016)

In the 2016 Y6 cohort, there were 2 pupils eligible for Pupil Premium Grant in KS2.

100% were at the expected standard in Maths, Reading and Writing combined and 50% of children were working at Greater depth.

- This shows that children eligible for Pupil Premium grant were working above the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths
- PP children made more progress from Year 2 to Year 6 in Reading and Writing, than Non PP children and slightly less in maths
